Galveston Hurricane Destruction and Devastation

On September 8, 1900, Galveston, Texas was hit with a level four hurricane, killing approximately 8,000 of its citizens. The hurricane winds were severe with winds greater than 130 miles per hour and many buildings were rapidly destroyed by the storm. The storm also brought rain and high tides, which contributed to the severity of the destruction. When the city was being rebuilt, many of the buildings were raised at least ten feet to prevent future damage from hurricanes. A sea wall was also constructed to attempt to protect the city from future storms. The wall was 17 feet high and 10 miles long. This wall helped to shelter Galveston during a hurricane in 1961 and during Hurricane Ike in 2008 (Britannica, 2021).

You are in a Public Speaking class and are assigned to give a persuasive speech. You are given five topics to choose from:

- Should college athletes be paid?
- Should self-driving vehicles be encouraged?
- Should voting be mandatory?
- Should the minimum wage in the country be increased?
- Should schools be year-round?
- Describe the steps that are necessary for planning out this presentation. Will you use any strategies to help you be successful?
- Use the rest of today's session to plan out a persuasive speech from the topics given.
 You will be in charge of managing your time. You do not need to finish, but whatever is not completed you will complete at home and come prepared to present during our next session.

Clinician: Read aloud the information while presenting the patient with the corresponding slides to see. There will be more verbal information presented than what is displayed on the slide (simulating a real-life lecture).

Clinician reads aloud: "You are taking a Psychology class this semester. Today's lecture is on sleep and sleep cycles. Listen to the lecture while following along with the slides and take notes on key information!"

Slide 1: "The first stage is the N1, light sleep phase. It is a very brief period of sleep that generally lasts less than 10 minutes. During this first stage, the heart rate gradually begins to slow and the muscles become more relaxed. The brain waves in Stage 1 of sleep primarily consist of low voltage waves, referred to as theta waves. During this stage, it is easy for individuals to be woken up."

Slide 2: "The body then transitions into the second stage of sleep, which is referred to as N2, or the "deeper sleep" stage. This stage is fundamental for learning and memory. This stage involves sleep spindles, which are characterized by frequent and fast neuronal firing. Theta waves are also present. During this phase, the heart rate and breathing decrease even more. This stage of sleep makes up about 45% of total sleep."



Student Needs: Taking Notes: Clinician Instructions Honeycomb Speech Therapy: Activity Studio

Slide 3: "The 3rd phase is the final stage prior to REM sleep, also known as N3 or Non-REM sleep. It involves delta waves, which are longer and slower waves. This phase takes up approximately 25% of sleep. It is harder to wake individuals who are in this phase of sleep. During this phase, the body develops bone and muscle and makes necessary repairs as the human growth hormone (HGH) is released. Night terrors and sleepwalking typically occur in this phase."

Slide 4: "REM sleep is the 4th and deepest stage of sleep. It involves beta waves. REM takes up approximately 25% of the total sleep cycle, but does not start until an individual has been asleep for at least 90 minutes. This is a "less restful" stage of sleep as a person's breathing rate is more irregular, the muscles are activated, and there are rapid eye movements. Dreaming and nightmares tend to occur during this phase. Infants tend to experience significantly more REM sleep, but as we age, the amount of REM sleep decreases."

Stage 1 of Sleep (N1/Lightest Sleep Phase)

- Only about 5% of total sleep cycle
- Breathing slows and • muscles relax
- Brain creates alpha waves ۲ that then transition into theta waves

Stage 2 of Sleep (N2/Deeper Sleep Phase)

- Body enters into a deeper . sleep.
- Heart rate and body • temperature decrease, while eye movement completely stops.
- Muscles continue relaxing. •
- Brain creates strong movements that are referred to as sleep spindles.

Stage 3 of Sleep (N3/Deepest Non-REM Sleep)


- Primarily consists of delta waves during this stage
- Very hard to be woken up during this phase
- Muscles relax even more .
- Heartbeat/breathing decrease to the lowest level
- Sleepwalking and night • terrors occur during this phase




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
